- To promote an understanding between Canada's various cultural groups and the
 value of the contributions of people from a wide variety of cultures, races and
 religions in their community, Canada and the world.
- To promote an understanding and appreciation of the similarities and differences among individuals and groups, and to understand the influence of cultural traditions on individuals and groups.

CONTENT

The candidate must:

1. Correspond regularly (a minimum of four times) with an individual from a different culture (ie from another country, or from a distinct cultural group within Canada such as the Inuit). Correspondence could take place via traditional letter writing, e-mail, telecommunications, or any other appropriate means.

2. Demonstrate a knowledge and understanding of a distinct culture other than their own. Areas of focus should include:

Language Festivals/Celebrations

Food Social Customs

Clothing Education Family Roles Recreation

Religion Music

Social Structure

DURATION

No time limit.

CERTIFICATION

It is suggested that each candidate prepare a written or oral report and present their information to members of their unit. Some possible formats include:

- 1. Each candidate, or group of candidates working on the same culture, could host a meeting dedicated to their culture (ie. a Caribbean Night). Some theme nights would allow for all members of the unit to be exposed to a variety of cultures in a very meaningful way.
- 2. The unit could hold a "Multicultural Festival" where all candidates would present their work at a single event. Static displays, demonstrations, interactive activities, food and beverage samples, etc. could be combined to provide a fun and exciting learning opportunity.
- 3. Be creative! The only limit is your imagination.
